

### **Nursery Staff**





Kinetic Letters in Pre-Nursery.

Pre-Nursery children have been strengthening their fingers and developing dexterity during their Kinetic Letters sessions. Fine Motor exercises such as Threading, snipping paper with scissors, pinching pegs and using tweezers to exercise their pincer grip, is helping their little fingers prepare for mark making and eventually letter formation.



We have had an exciting start to the school year and Kindergarten have settled in very well. We are getting used to new routines and walking around school. Our first topic 'All about me' has let us discover some exciting things about ourselves.

We are enjoying getting to know each other and all of the lovely grown ups that work in our class.

The children have really embraced our outdoor provision and have had lots of fun!




On Wednesday 14th September, Upper II were evacuated to Bewdley. Our day started with a trip to Kidderminster on a steam train, built in the 1940s. We travelled through tunnels and past an airfield, imagining how children must have felt during 'Operation Pied Piper'.

Once we arrived at the museum in Bewdley, we learned all about what life was like during the war; rationing, black out curtains and the air raid sirens. We were able to go inside an Anderson Shelter and tried to imagine how it would feel to be inside all night, with the sound of bombs going off outside.

Frankie dressed as an ARP warden; she had to shout to warn people to 'Turn that light off!'. We also practised picking up unexploded bombs, to see how quickly we could get them into a bucket of sand.

Our final task was 'rag rugging'; using old pieces of fabric to create warm, colourful rugs for around the home.




### **BOOKS TO READ**


As you can see, there are lots of books in the library about different topics and celebrations in autumn. I hope that you enjoy reading some books that I have recommended. ENJOY!!!

## Kinetic Letters

### **Mrs Inkster**

The children become familiar with Bounce the brave monkey and Skip the scared monkey who both help them recognise where to start to form each letter. The tree's branches f show the correct height for each letter. This makes sure letters are the correct size in relation to each other as well as reminding the children to ground each of their letters on the line.


We are aiming for 'automaticity' in our writers. This is when letter formation, orientation and placement of letters becomes automatic and frees up space in the working memory.

If you would like to find out more information on Kinetic Letters Handwriting and how we are leaching it in school there is a parent workshop for parents of pupils in Kindergarten to Lower III in the main school hall on Friday IIth November, 2022 2:45 pm till 3:30 pm. 
Since September, you may have heard your child uttering phrases like, 'brave monkey, scared monkey' 'three by the tree', slope, slide, push' or telling you they have been sitting as a meerkat or lined up like a penguin. These are just a few of the phrases associated with the Kinetic Letters Handwriting scheme we have introduced across the school.

Kinetic Letters Handwriting allows children to learn letter formation through movement in a unique whole body approach to handwriting. It consists of four key elements: strong bodies, correct letter formation, correct pencil hold and flow and fluency.

Bounce, Skip and Turlle have arrived in classrooms across the school with their cheeky stories to help us remember these strands.










There are a rew key aspects of Kinetic Letters to be aware of: letters are formed with a distinctive flick on the end, preparing the children for when they join letters in the later years. We learn letters by moving to make our bodies look like letters, saying the language as we make the letters and finally writing the letter using the language. We leach the children exercises to strengthen core muscles to help with their writing.
