In November, Form II were treated to a visit from Walsall Fire Station's Green Watch. We watched a film about fire safety in the home which showed how quickly a fire spreads in just three minutes. They also showed us a smoke alarm which, when activated, would wake even the deepest sleeper!

Form II did a wonderful job of identifying potential hazards in the home, including unattended candles, cooking equipment and electrical appliances. We learned what to do in the event of a fire, from shouting for help to calling 999. The firefighters taught us the 'stop, drop and roll' technique to use in the event of clothes catching fire.


Green Watch were very impressed with the children's knowledge of car and road safety, the class had a discussion around the importance of keeping themselves and other passengers safe by sitting quietly, not distracting the driver and wearing a seatbelt. As pedestrians, we looked at correct and safe behaviour when crossing roads. Form II completed a quiz to test their memory on what they had learned about fire, road and car safety, then had an opportunity to ask the Firefighters all about the incredible job they do.



At the end of the afternoon, Green Watch told Mrs Guest that Form II were the most attentive and well-behaved class they had met, so we are very proud of them all!









Upper II have been investigating forces in Science, and were tasked with constructing a parachute to safely transport an egg back to the ground. We carried out an investigation during lessons to explore how to make our parachutes successful. Pupils used a range of materials to make their parachutes with various degrees of success.

Karram said, "I enjoyed this experiment because it was fun and enjoyable to watch parachutes land and the eggs cracking"

Kimran agreed with Karram, she said, "I enjoyed waiting to see if the egg would crack. I made my parachute by sewing 4 pieces of fabric together, and some buttons on for decoration. I was really pleased that my egg survived!"





The world cup got off to a great start with all students in UII and LIII taking part in 'Literacy Through Sport' – a World Cup writing lesson which was led by the Author of "Write like a Ninja". This gave the children lots of 'Top Tips' to make their writing even more engaging. The children produced a fantastic piece of writing based on this workshop. The scenario that they were given put them 'in the shoes' of a footballer about to take a penalty.



LIII recently had a trip to The Lockup – Police Museum in Birmingham. The day entailed a workshop based on Crime and Punishment and a general history of policing in the United Kingdom. After the workshop, students had a tour of the cells, we experienced a cell lit solely by a candle behind a screen to the cell – the conditions surprised us all. After the tour, the children had the opportunity to: dress up in Police uniform from across the ages, be a Detective and to learn about handwriting analysis. The feedback was great from the children – an experience to remember.










### Poppies, Pudsey and MacMillian


Sehej recently took part in the Staffordshire County Junior Chess championship and won the Under 9s trophy. What a brilliant achievement Sehej – well done!
