The Early Years curriculum encourages children to explore and respond to different natural phenomena in their setting and during this snowy day they undoubtedly did that.

Transition have had an amazing half term filled with lots of fun learning and activities! We started with Chinese New Year, and thoroughly enjoyed our dance workshop based on the Great Zodiac Race. We also won the Great Wall of China competition with our fantastic teamwork to create a long, sponge printed representation of the wall.

We really enjoyed our class assembly all about penguins and Antarctica, and thoroughly enjoyed showing off not only our fantastic knowledge, but also our lovely artwork! As part of our Geography topic, we have also learned about how penguins, camels and polar bears have adapted to survive in their habitats, and then looked at the food chain of a polar bear in the Arctic.

To consolidate our learning on penguins and habitats, we visited the Sealife Centre with Form I. We loved watching the Gentoo penguins and we also had the opportunity to see a range of fascinating sea creatures. We took part in an interesting workshop all about Habitats and we found out about the different layers of the ocean and some of the weird and wonderful creatures who live in each one. We then discussed adaptation and investigated how thick otter fur is! No wonder they stay nice and warm when swimming!

Form I braved the frosty and snowy weather to venture out for their Forest Schools adventures this half term. We all enjoyed exploring this natural habitat and developing our teamwork skills. In Science, we have been learning about different habitats, so we were able to undertake lots of practical activities to support our learning. Despite the cold weather, we managed to find a few minibeasts lurking under dried leaves and under the soil! We heard bird song, too! One of our favourite tasks was to create a bug hotel. We tried to create a suitable habitat for minibeasts. We discovered that woodlice and worms prefer a moist, dark habitat. Using cardboard tubes, we worked together to line them with broken, dried leaves, soil and twigs. Once ready, we had to decide on a suitable location to attract minibeasts. Some of us buried them under piles of leaves and protected them from the wind by placing sticks around them. Some bug hotels were hidden in the branches of trees or even buried under the ground to attract worms.

One of our favourite activities during Forest Schools was playing games such as Hide and Seek! However, we found the crunching of twigs beneath our feet often alerted the finder to our hiding place. Thank you to Mrs Higgins and Miss Roberts for working with us.















This term, Lower II have been learning about the religion of Islam. They have learnt about when and where the religion was founded, the main beliefs, the holy book and place of worship, as well as key events in the Islamic calendar and symbols of the religion. To experience what the holy place of worship for Muslims is like, Lower II had the chance to visit a local mosque; The Aisha Mosque in Walsall.

The Imam, a leader of the mosque, welcomed the children and everyone had to take their shoes off and place them on a rack. He then took the class to the main hall and explained about the Islamic faith, prayer, the key beliefs or the 5 pillars of Islam and about the mosque and local community. The children were very good listeners and were able to answer questions based on their learning in class.

Finally, they had the opportunity to see the rest of the rooms, including the wash area and finished with a snack in the community room. Thank you to Nabiha's and Aleena's (UII) mothers who came along and helped.







Form II had a wonderful day at the Think Tank in January, a lovely start to the new term! We started by exploring the Spitfire Gallery, reading all about the history of how these amazing machines were designed. Their cutting-edge technology meant that they played a key role in the Second World War and have left a legacy in the city of Birmingham.

The class were then invited into a lab, where we put on white coats and safety goggles for a Changing Materials workshop. This explored how solids, liquids and gases can create different results when mixed. For example, did you know that a mixture of white vinegar and baking soda can inflate a balloon?

After lunch we gathered in the theatre to watch a show called 'Cauldron Chemistry,' where a scientist treated Form II to a magical display of potion-making, mysterious spells and explosions.

Form II had a fabulous time and learned lots more about different states of matter, as well as the history of Birmingham and its surrounding areas.

Martin Luther King Junior was born on 15th January,1929, in Atlanta, Georgia. The children came to understand the importance of an individual's heritage and how this had been portrayed in Frida's creative work.


A great time was had by all, it was a very difficult choice choosing the best Great Wall of China as all the entries were outstanding. Well done to Transition's winning entry.





#### Emotional Regulation Tips for EVERYONE




- 1.Be patient and realistic about what your child is developmentally capable of.
- 2. Allow your child to feel all emotions even the tough ones.
- 3. Build coping skills by reflecting on emotions.
- 4. Model regulation skills in tough moments.
- 5. Manage the emotion and express it in a healthy way.


