Mixing different colours





We had great fun on World Book Day, dressing up as our favourite book characters and making bookmarks.






As part of Lower II's 'Rocks and Soils' Science topic this half term, the children have been developing their research skills to produce a fact file about one of Britain's first palaeontologists, Mary Anning. The children had a wide range of sources including books, educational programmes, and the internet to access to research this amazing pioneer.

The children clearly enjoyed sourcing materials especially from the internet and have honed their independent computing research skills be asking pertinent questions to provided succinct and relevant answers. By using the internet, the children have found that their vocabulary knowledge have developed and in addition to their note taking skills.

Many of the children, have been inspired by Mary's journey from orphaned girl who collected 'curiosities' along the Dorset coastline to now one of the most recognisable female scientists in British history. As you can see, the children are clearly enjoying this area of science and there is a strong possibility that we may be looking at palaeontologists and geologists of the future!











This term, Form II have been learning about the Vikings. As part of this topic, in Design and Technology, the class were set the task to design and make a Viking Longboat. The children learned about the Viking invasion and how they travelled in their longboats. We created a success criteria of features that their model needed to include. In groups, the children first drew their design and planned the resources that they would need. Then using card, masking tape, straws and split pins the children made their longboats. The class used their knowledge and skills to attach materials together, ensuring their models were sturdy and was able to stand unaided. Well done, Form II, on your fantastic Viking longboat models.















This term, Upper II have been researching what they consider to be the best invention of the last 100 years. Pupils had to prepare a speech to explain why they had chosen this invention as well as giving us some information about who invented it, when it was made and how it has transformed our world. They then had to be prepared to answer questions from their peers regarding their invention, some of whom had a differing opinion of this invention! This sparked some healthy debates amongst the class as they passionately defended their invention.

The smart phone, internet and computers were very popular choices, with a number of pupils choosing these products. We also had support for the microwave, smoke detector, Apollo 11 launch as well as the ball point pen and a chainsaw! Pupils were in charge of voting for their favourites, and there were three different rounds. The winners then had the opportunity to use their newly developed debate skills against the Lower III pupils in a debate in front of the school. Congratulations to Dylan K, Sehej S, Aarav and Sumayya who made it through to the final.





Over the course of the last term, the children have studied and replicated the work of Frida Kahlo in their Art lessons. The topic started with independent research, on the artist's famous works, techniques, and life. Students went on to produce their own portrait piece- featuring Frida herself- including typical features seen within her paintings. 
# Champs

### **Mrs Draper**


British Science week is a 10-day celebration of all things STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) related. This year's theme for events was **Time**.


At Mayfield Preparatory School, we have been focusing on the theme of **Time for the last 100 years,** linking in with our celebrations for Mayfield's Centenary. In school we have been investigating inventions and inventors from the last 100 years. Upper II and Lower III, focused on preparing and presenting a speech about the scientific invention that has proved to be the greatest during the last 100 years. Initially heats were held in class for pupils to vote for the most persuasive arguments. Then pupils from Transition to Lower III heard the finalists present their persuasive arguments. Inventions ranged from the computer, smart phone, smoke alarms and the heart pacemaker. All speakers had shown an in-depth knowledge of their invention and had a good grasp of persuasive language. The winner, voted for by the pupils was the Covid-19 vaccine!

Other year groups have investigated the 1969 Moon Landing, the development of television over the last 100 years and using coding skills to travel through time!

In addition, to encourage our passion for promoting independent learning at Mayfield, we held this year's poster competition. Pupils were asked to design and create a poster on the theme of **Time**. The possibilities were endless, with entries ranging from changes over time (life-cycles, food chains, how different types of rocks are created, reversible and irreversible changes, evolution, phases of the moon, technological inventions and also futuristic inventions!







